This is the archaeological site of Acropolis.
We can visit the site.

This way everything is safe.
- ✓ During the visit I stay close to those who accompany me.
- ✓ I walk slowly and I am careful with my movements.
- ✓ I speak in a low voice. I can also use my inner voice.

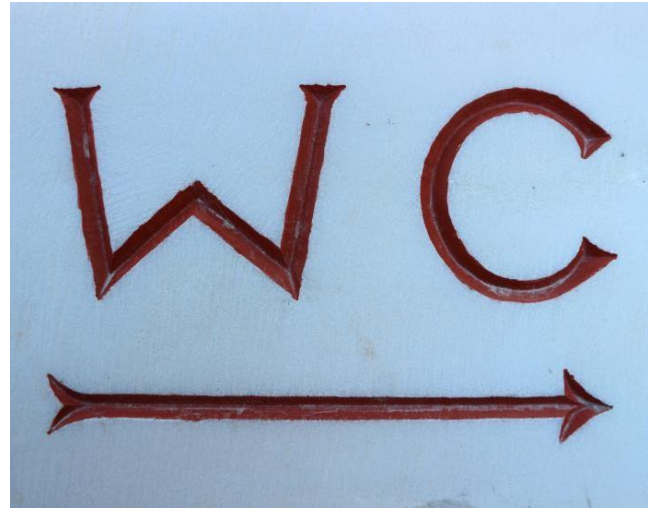

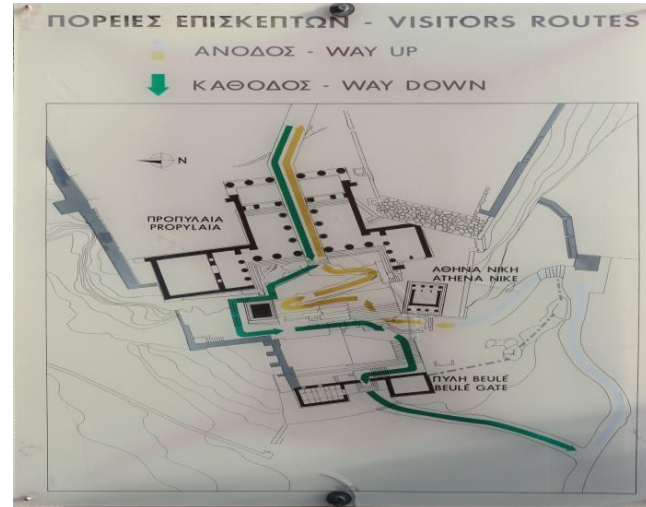

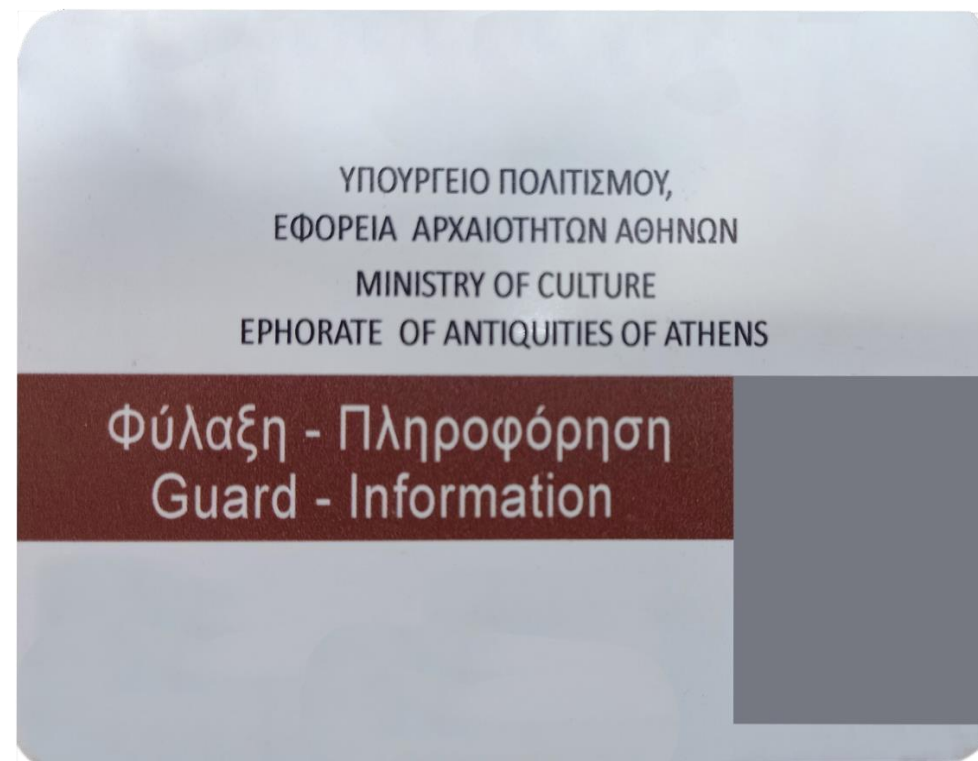
There are toilets, water-taps and water vending machines on site.

I can ask the staff for help.



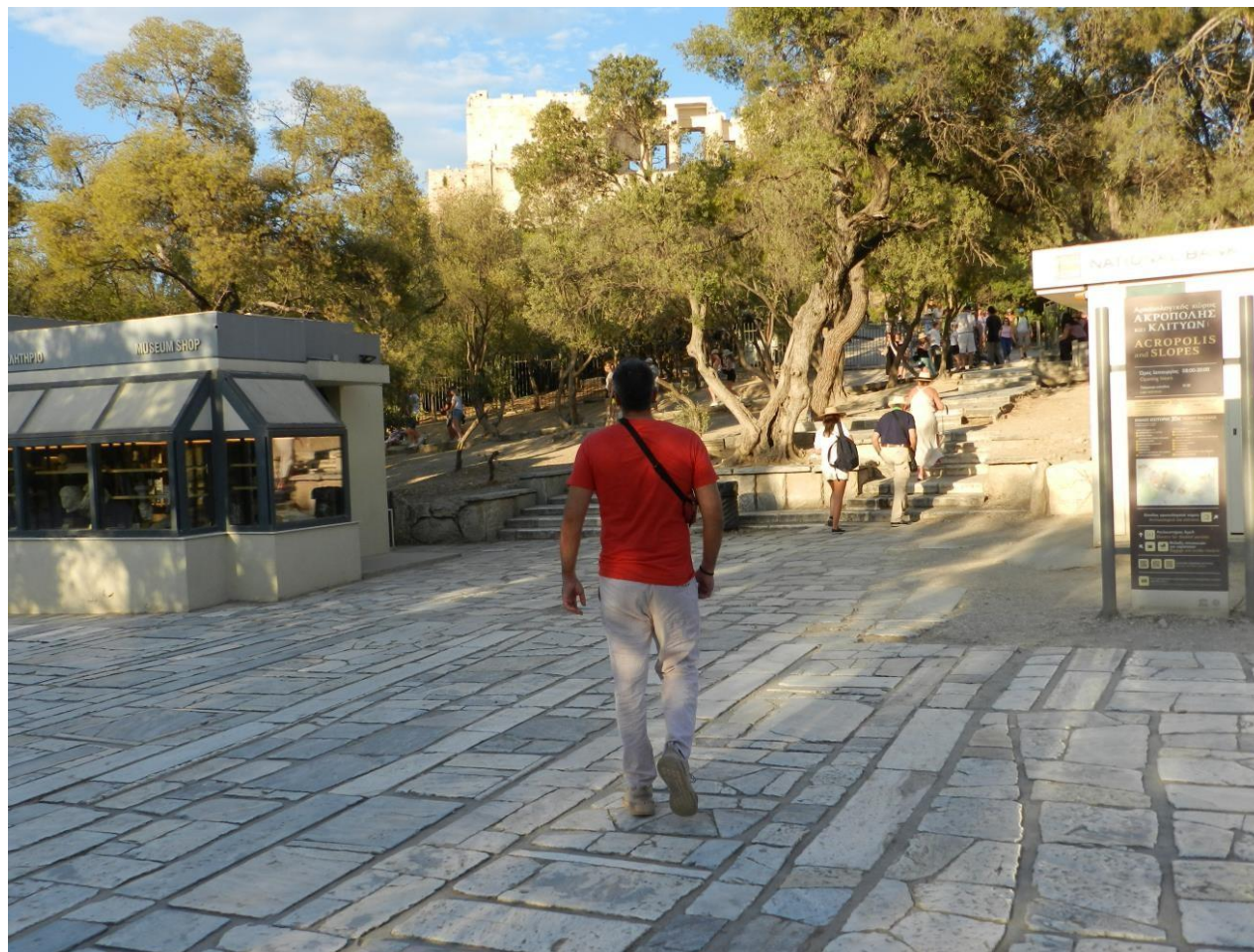
The people of the archaeological site wear name cards.

The ticket office is in the entrance of the archaeological site. That's where I can buy my ticket. I might need to stay in queue.

I continue my route.



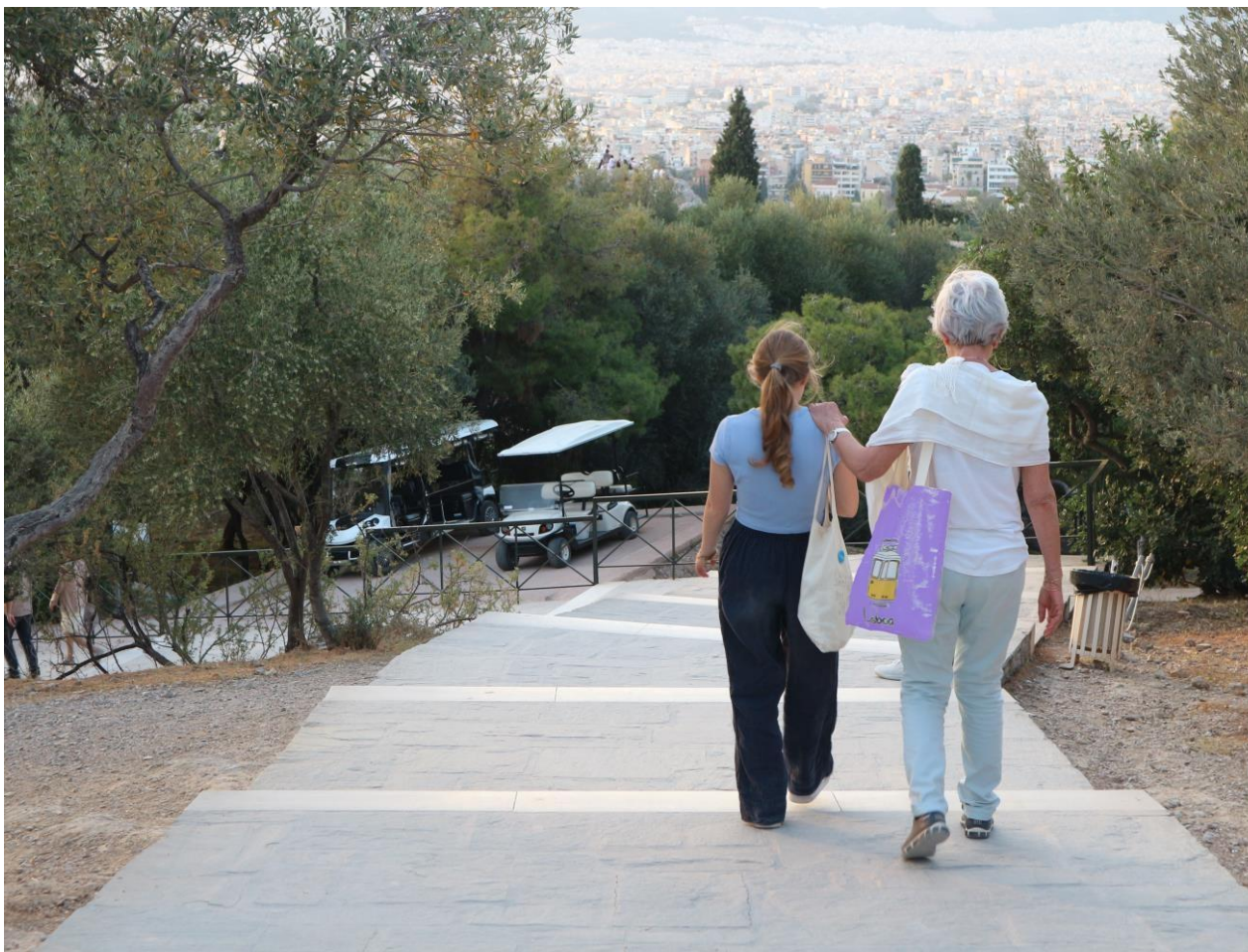
Moving on, I see the Parthenon on my right.
