This is the archaeological site of Roman Agora.
We can visit the site.

There are rules in the archaeological site:

- ✓ I look at the monuments from a distance without touching.
This way everything is safe.
- ✓ During the visit I stay close to those who accompany me.
- ✓ I walk slowly and I am careful with my movements.
- ✓ I speak in a low voice. I can also use my inner voice.

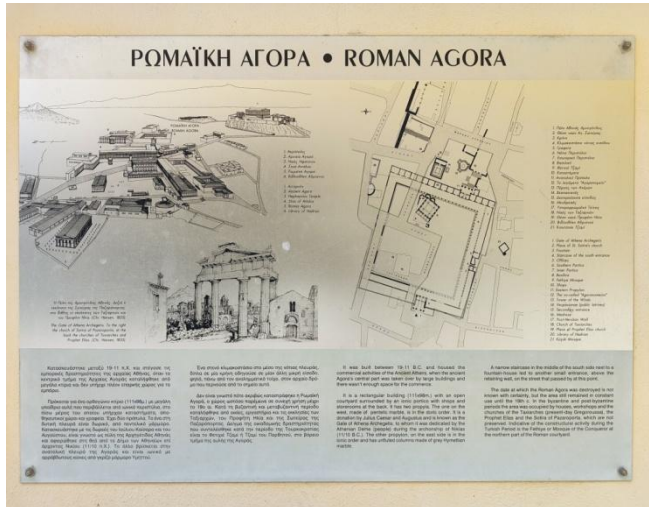

I collect my ticket from the ticket office.



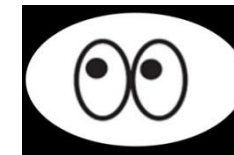
I begin my visit at the Gate of Athena Archegetis.

To my right is the Fethiye Mosque.
It is also called the Wheatmarket Mosque.



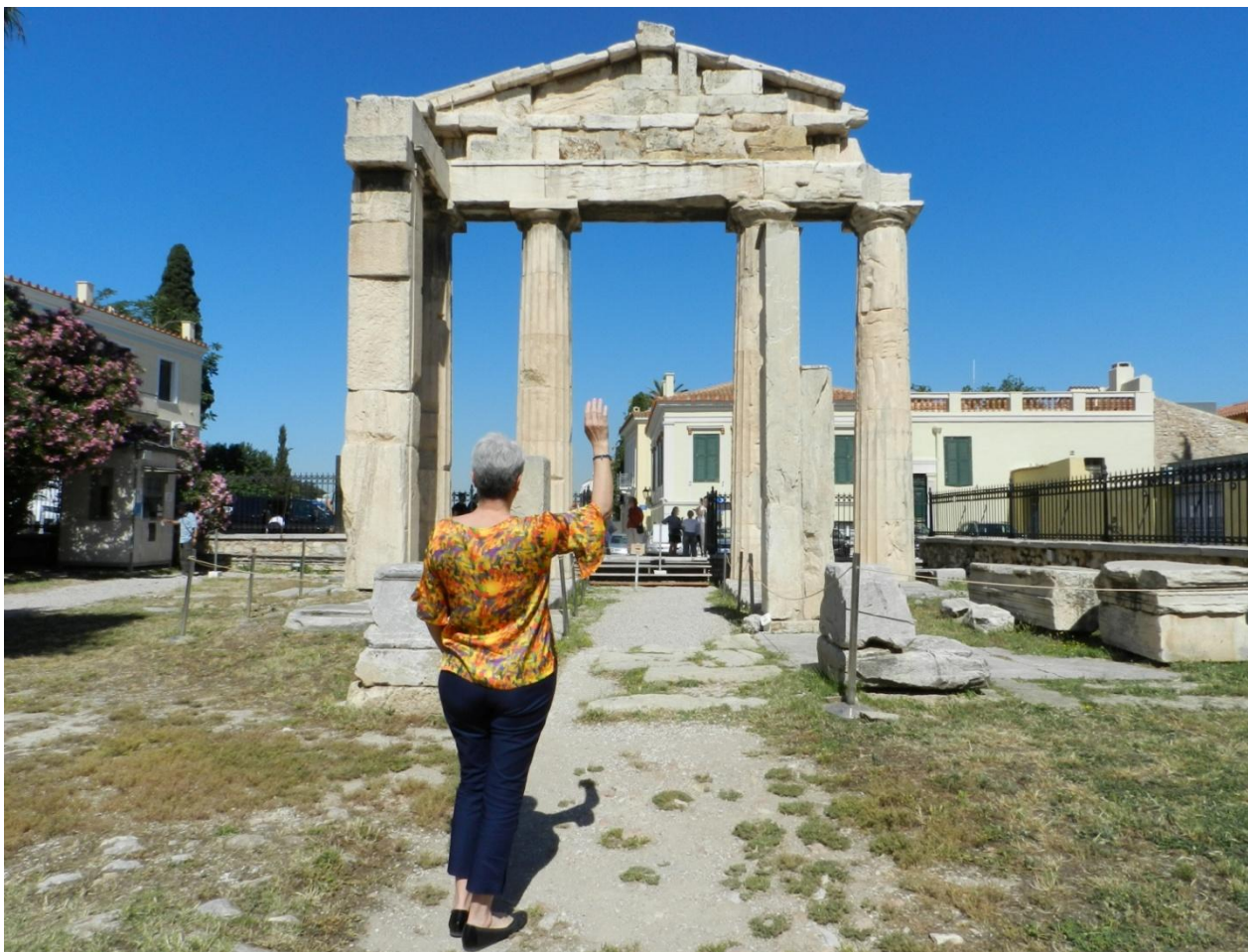
I'm continuing on my way.
